

Reported Cases

There were 584 total complaints brought to the Committee on Discipline's attention in academic year 2021-2022. The Committee on Discipline (COD), chaired by Professor Jay Scheib, resolved complaints by adjudicating cases of alleged misconduct. Of those 584 complaints, 552 (95%) were complaints alleging individual student misconduct and 32 (5%) were complaints alleging student organization misconduct.

Case Trend

The case numbers for this past year continued to reflect the impact of the Covid-19 pandemic, altered campus access, and Covid-19 policies. 48% (281) of the cases pertained to violations of Covid-19 policies. Reports of academic misconduct increased by 20%. Personal misconduct (excluding Covid-19 policies) increased by 170% from the prior year.



The above stacked bar chart, entitled "Complaints by Type July 2012 to June 2022," shows that the number of cases reported to the COD over a ten-year period. The chart shows the number of cases reported to the COD in each academic year: 241 cases in 2014-2015, 255 cases in 2015-2016, 279 cases in 2016-2017, 232 cases in 2017-2018, 286 cases in 2018-2019, 290 cases in 2019-2020, 812 cases in 2020-2021, and finally, 584 cases in 2021-2022 as noted above.

The tables below summarize alleged policy violations from 2021-2022 compared to previous years. There is often more than one alleged policy violation per complaint, so there are more alleged policy violations than total complaints.

Case Resolutions

The COD utilizes resolution methods as described in the <u>Rules of the Committee on Discipline</u>.

Given the unique risk factors associated with students returning to campus and the need to take immediate action to address noncompliance with MIT's Covid-19 policies, the COD delegated authority to the Office of Student Conduct & Community Standards ("OSCCS") to address violations of MIT's Covid-19 student and Institute-wide policies on an expedited basis.

^{*} Dismissal is not the same as a finding of not responsible. It means that the situation did not rise to the level of a possible policy violation, but still may have involved educational follow up.

Case Outcomes

COD strives to meet its educational philosophy of student accountability through intentional educational sanctions (e.g., substance use education, mentoring programs, projects, reflections, workshops, etc.). Through these structured sanctions, students learn about various interpersonal skills and are able to reflect on their own personal development. A small number of cases (0.5% in 2021-2022) require a student to be separated from the Institute, either temporarily or permanently. 99.5% of cases are resolved without suspension or expulsion.

Note: It is common for the COD to assign more than one sanction in a case, so there are more sanctions than cases. Sanctions exclude all cases in which the respondent was found not responsible, the case was dismissed or the case is still pending.
